Committee Reports:

Civic Affairs -- At large City Council candidates will have a forum at the Park Fair Mall on Saturday, January 17th. The Beaverdale Neighborhood Association will host a forum after the primary.

Community Service -- Department of Transportation (DOT) has sent a letter announcing that they will be starting a program for I235 similar to the Highway Adoption Program. There was discussion as to how this came about and whether there was interest to participate.

Beautification -- There may be flower seeds made available to the Assn from Meredith Corporation. January 20th will be a Community Gardens meeting. There was a discussion of what the program is and where the Assn might sponsor a garden. Bernie will check on the cost of getting water to the Assn's lot on 24th street and the freeway. Mark suggested planting pumpkins in preparation for a Halloween Party.

History -- no report

House Tour -- Marti Schmitt has enough homes as sites for the tour which will likely occur in early June.

Building Bridges -- The Ingleside Hills area is getting its self organized. Some of their boundaries overlap with the Assn. The January 9, 1998, *Des Moines Register* had a cover page article on their efforts. Tony Schmitt has been in contact with a couple residents in that area.

Special Events -- no report

Members Services -- The Spring Drake Events calendar has recently been mailed.

Organization Reports:

Drake University -- Last weekend there was a reception at Olmsted for participants in the Lend-A-Hand Program.

Des Moines Neighbors -- They will elect new officers next week. The \$15.00 yearly dues are due. Eldon will attend a one time informational meeting concerning the Downtown Arena. Upon proper motion and vote, Bill Cappuccio will attend the Des Moines Neighbors meetings as the Board's representative with Catherine Dietz-Kilen serving as backup. The December 1997 meeting explained the Bankers Trust loan program for neighborhoods and the announcement of the DOT's version of the adopt-a-highway program.

Neighborhood Housing Services -- The organization is doing well with the one mind set it has concerning rehabilitation of homes. A Tool Lending Library Report was distributed. The report gave numbers for the past year and goals for 1998. There was a general discussion of the Betterment Grant Report which has a deadline coming up soon and what projects would be appropriate such as: cement park benches for Drake Park or another area and funding a Scrub Day.

Carpenter/Drake Park Revitalization -- There is a new city staff person assigned to this group. There are goals and projects but now the need is for individual projects to proceed. A small group is meeting.

Legislative Issues -- A letter was read from Ed Fallon. The Urban Sprawl issue is not expected to have much action this legislative session. Ed is still looking for his book which he loaned out at the October Annual Meeting. January 17th will be a conference of a group titled Thousand Friends of Iowa. There was a discussion of some of the upcoming issues which may include a bill to reduce bottle recycling measures in Iowa.

An effort will be made to put the notice of this meeting on the phone distribution system by the narcotics squad.
- -- Possible projects for 1998 were discussed.

b) Catherine shared her experience with Allied Insurance and acquiring home owners coverage of an older home. She will find out

Minutes of the January 1998 meeting were approved with the correction of Ron Langston as absent and James Monroe as excused. The Treasurers Report was given as a balance of \$3593.34. The House Tour Committee has decided to send some money to the Assn's account. This will be coming in the next few weeks.

The agenda was rearranged.

New Business

• Don Adams representing the Healthy Polk 2000 Committee presented to the Board some background on the group. There are 20 working study groups which grew out of the organization Healthy Iowa 2000. The group is looking at such things as immunization and health record keeping, and prenatal care. They have developed a map of the county's free medical clinics for use by the 911 dispatchers. A coordinated task to better use existing resources.

Now they are meeting with various neighborhood groups to publicize their efforts. Mr. Adams shared with the Board several versions of their Vision/Mission Statements and requested comments. He also asked what health related needs are not being met in the neighborhood. The responses included: encourage a bike path, knowing what recreation spots are currently available in the neighborhood.

Mr. Adams then spoke to the group as a Drake University representative and praised the coordinated effort of the Building Bridges Task Force. He also thanked the community for their support with the recent reaccreditation peer review team visit on campus.

Ton Schmitt asked whether the Neighborhood Activities Card would allow Assn members library privileges. Mr. Adams responded he would take the question to the University and have Forrest Meyer respond.

•Maurice Buven and his wife Mary made a presentation concerning their efforts to place a Great Harvest Bread Co store in a Des Moines neighborhood. He explained a bit about the company and as former DNA members they were looking for possible store locations in our boundaries. Several sites/addresses were shared. This venture could open as soon as September 1998.

Committee Reports:

Civic Affairs -- the 31st and University article in today's *Des Moines Register* was discussed. Although the article used correct information, Toni indicated he was disappointed in the negative slant to the story. The piece did not mention the stoplight which is expected to be installed at 31st and Kingman.

-- There was a reminder of the upcoming City Council election.

Community Service -- Bankers Trust has make their Speakers List available to us.

- -- The First Christian Church is still desiring to participate more in the neighborhood. Their Paster would like to meet with some of us.
- -- There will be Tai Chi in the Park again in Drake Park during the sumemr of 1998.

Beautification -- The Scrub Day application has been filed. The dates chosen were later in the summer/fall. The Drake Park group has requested a fall date also, and Carpenter Neighbors has applied for a spring date.

History -- A State Historical Society letter has been received which lists several areas in Des Moines that appear on the Historical Registry. Copies of the survey from our area are still available.

House Tour -- Plans continue.

Building Bridges -- no report

Special Events -- There will be a Farmer's Market in 1998.
-- Mayor Preston Daniels will be the speaker at the April 17th general association meeting.

Members Services -- no report

Organization Reports:

Drake University -- Toni Schmitt participated in the interviews by the review team concerning Drake's accreditation.

-- April 25th is the Drake Relays Parade and we have been invited to participate. A float promoting the House Tour was discussed.

Des Moines Neighbors -- Bob Nichols has been elected President. There has been a consultant presentation on the arena project. Downtown continues to be the preferred location. There is an expected June referendum on the issue. This would be a county wide project and not use any property taxes.

Neighborhood Housing Services -- Eldon is now the chair of the Rehab Committee. The house on 23rd street did not get accepted as the program is full for the year.

Carpenter/Drake Park Revitalization -- There is concern about using the money that they have for projects yet to be identified. It was suggested that Mary Welsh @ CCI may have a records of previously noted needs.

Legislative Issues -- no report

Old Business:

- -- The Community Gardens Project has been joined by the Botanical Center. This could mean some equipment and expertise resources to the whole project. Drake students are writing a survey that may be sent to the DNA membership. Locations for a pilot project for 1998 were discussed. They included the lots on 24th street at I235 or the former Memorial Hall site at 26th and University. The next meeting is March 3rd at the First Christian Church. Teeva Dawson may become the director or coordinator of the whole project if funds can be acquired.
- -- The I235 Roadside Cleanup signup was so successful that our preferred section of the freeway was already taken by the Beaverdale Neighborhood Assn and the Drake Greeks before our request was received. An effort will be made to collaborate with these groups. April 18th is the first scheduled cleanup. March 5th will be an informational meeting.
- -- There was a conditional use permit issue update considering the recent Planning & Zoning Committee favorable vote. Bill Cappuccio reminded the group that the portion of the ordinance that has the 'teeth' in the issue is the nuisance abatement portion.

Nathan Brooks was introduced and nominated to be a Board member. He has lived in the area since 1987. Upon motion and vote, Nathan Brooks joined the DNA Board. Introductions and welcome were offered by all present.

Committee Reports:

Civic Affairs -- There will be a public meeting next Monday, 3:00-6:00 p.m. at Callahan School regarding the 31st street and University intersection. This is a presentation meeting from the city. Tony will try to get this announced through the police phone system. -- April 19th will be a Neighborhood Resource Fair at North High School. This even came out of the Town Meeting on Community Policing. It is an effort to share information of what resources exist in the area already. Persons that preregister by phone will be given a free lunch. This happens to be the same day as the Carpenter Cleanup Day and the I235 Cleanup.

Community Service -- Betterment Grant applications are available from the Neighborhood Housing Services. They have ten \$1,000 grants for improvement of public spaces. Bernie Burke will work on preparing an application to be used on the Community Gardens Project.

Beautification -- The Botanical Centers flower application has been received and completed. We hope to receive the same amount as last year.

-- We have been allocated a Scrub Day in September 1998. Saturday, September 19th will be the shared date for the Goode Park, Drake Park and DNA groups.

History -- The North of Grand and Woodland Heights groups will be working with the DNA to jointly prepare an Historic District application. This action if and when approved would not only provide a sense of pride for the designated area but some federal tax considerations are possible.

There was a motion made and passed to continue work with other groups on the Historic District designation.

House Tour -- Sunday, May 31st will be the House Tour beginning at St Catherine's at University and 28th street. Approximately ten stops are planned which will feature new construction in an older neighborhood. The tour may include Bernie's backyard. Forrest will look into making arrangements for a Drake University van to drive the DNA float in the Relays parade April 25th. There was discussion about paying from Tour proceeds for wooden house signs. This idea was well received by the Board.

Building Bridges -- On Sat, May 2nd, there will be a Fun Run & Festival.

Special Events -- The Jazz in July application has been received. The Friends of Drake Arts are meeting next week which Tony will attend. There was discussion about the successful 1997 event.

Members Services -- no report

Organization Reports:

Drake University -- Forrest reported that neighborhood members were welcome to use the Cowles Library on site but not receive check out privileges. The outdoor athletic facility of the stadium track and basketball courts are available for general use. -- Next week, David McCullough will present a free, open-to-the-public lecture on Wednesday evening, March 18th in Sheslow Auditorium.

Des Moines Neighbors -- The most recent meeting was a presentation on a Grays Lake project. The plan would include development on the south side of the lake and perhaps a walkway over Fleur Drive.

Neighborhood Housing Services -- no report

Carpenter/Drake Park Revitalization -- The Neighborhood Finance Corporation made a presentation about their programs available for

the Drake Park and Carpenter areas. There will be an interest/needs survey which the Drake Business Assn will be funding.

Legislative Issues -- There was a discussion of the southeast side of Des Moines annexation progress and an explanation of possible impact on any annexation in the state of lowa. There was a sphere of influence discussion when Urban Sprawl concerns effect both the land owner and the development.

New Business

-- We received a presentation on the Callahan Middle School 7th Grade Service Project. They are raising \$12,000 for the Woodland Cemetery receiving vault's restoration. The three presenters outlined various fundraising activities to date and upcoming events such as April 18th will be a supper and auction and May 16th will be a Book-No Junk-Garage Sale. The students requested donations to the rummage sale and requested a contribution towards the expenses of the April 18th dinner.

The motion was made and approved to spend \$250.00 as a contribution towards the April 18th fundraising dinner.

Old Business:

updating session. The survey will soon go out.


<u>Legislative Issues</u> -- An update was offered on the Bottle Bill status along with the urban sprawl issue and the Friends of Iowa campaign.

Old Business:



NFC Expands Lending Area in the Drake Neighborhood

The Neighborhood Finance Corporation (NFC) has expanded the boundaries and created the City-Wide Home Improvement and Purchase Rehab Loan Programs. Both of these programs are now available in the Drake Neighborhood from 24th Street on the east, Hickman on the north, I-235 on the south, and the western boundary is 35th Street from I-235 to University Ave., 34th Street between University Ave. and Forest Ave., and 30th Street from Forest Ave. to Hickman. This program has been available in the Carpenter and Drake Park areas for the past few years.

The NFC has limited funds available for this program. It is estimated that there will be 2.5 million dollars available this year. There are other areas eligible in the City of Des Moines, therefore the funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The City-Wide Home Improvement Program is available for owner-occupied properties with 1-4 units. The program offers a forgivable loan rehab subsidy. For households at or below 80% of the area median income \$1 of subsidy will be matched with \$2 of loan funds. For those households above 80% of the area median income \$1 of subsidy will be matched with \$3 of loan funds. The subsidy can not exceed 15% of the appraised value or \$7500, whichever is less. The loan-to-value ratio or combined loan-to-value ratio can not exceed 95%. The subsidy will allow most borrowers to complete the rehab necessary while maintaining 5% equity in their property.

The City-Wide Purchase Rehab Program is to purchase owner-occupied properties with 1-4 units. This program offers a rehab subsidy, generally, up to 15% of the cost of the purchase price of the home plus the cost of repairs, or \$7500, whichever is less. An additional subsidy equal to 2% of the purchase price, up to \$1500, will be given to assist with down payment or closing costs.

The down payment required is either 3% or 5%, depending on the total family income. Mortgage Default Insurance is required on all loans with less than 20% down payment.

For both programs:

- All subsidies are in the form of a second mortgage that is forgiven over a five year period of owner-occupancy. Forgiveness of debt is taxable income.
- There is a non-refundable \$50 processing fee charged at the time of the loan application. Both programs have additional fees.
- The maximum loan amount is \$90,000.
- The interest rate for both programs is fixed but varies. Call the NFC for current rates.
- The underwriting guideline is 33% for housing debt and 38% for total debt.
- The credit guidelines follow Fannie Mae low and moderate underwriting guidelines.
- The term of the loan is less than \$500 up to 10 years; less than \$10,000 up to 15 years; more than \$10,000 up to 20 years; more than \$15,000 up to 30 years.
