Highlights of the University Town Hall meeting on Tuesday, October 7:

New programs and new building proposals will be submitted to the Board of Trustees on October 18. The SOE has one new program to be approved, the PE/Health/Coaching endorsement. Other new program proposals are kinesthesiology and data analytics in Arts and Sciences and occupational therapy in CPHS, all of which will contribute the the new STEM complex including the SOE/Math&Computer Science building, the lower level of which was announced by the President to be used to house the new Robert and Billie Ray Center - details forthcoming from him on that through university-wide communications. It is important that the new programs be approved because revenue from them will be used to finance the debt that will need to be incurred from all the new construction. Over 10 million has been raised so far (go, Jan!) and John Smith said he was confident they could raise another 20 million, and then the plan is to borrow 35 million to finance the entire complex.

As Iowa's largest public university scrambles for students, private colleges worry they will suffer Submitted by Ry Rivard on October 8, 2014 - 3:00am Some private colleges in Iowa worry they could end up having to shut down because of an aggressive effort by the University of Iowa to enroll more students from within the state.

The state Board of Regents <u>backed a funding plan</u> [1] earlier this year to encourage its three public universities to enroll more lowans. The plan could cost the University of lowa up to \$60 million over the next several years if the cosmopolitan university doesn't dramatically increase the number of lowans on its campus.

Jerome A. "Jerry" Lucido, executive director of the University of Southern California Center for Enrollment Research, Policy, and Practice, will discuss tensions over out-of-state admissions on "This Week," [2] Inside Higher Ed's free weekly news podcast, on Friday. To be notified of new editions of "This Week," sign up here. [3] About 14,000 of the University of Iowa's 30,000 students are from other states and abroad – and that has drawn criticism from some within the state. The university enrolls 3,200 fewer lowans than it did three decades ago. So, when the Board of Regents decided to revamp how it distributes money, it put a huge emphasis on in-state student headcount. In order to avoid losing millions of dollars because of the new formula, the University of Iowa is blitzing the state with a heavy marketing and recruitment effort for next fall's class....
