Principal Investigator: Anne Murr Project Title: Adult Literacy Summary: Since 1976 the Adult Literacy Center at Drake University has served the community by teaching adults to read, write, and comprehend. It is the only program in Central Iowa dedicated solely to improving the literacy of adults. Utilizing trained volunteers, the Adult Literacy Center provides a cost-effective way for low-skilled, low-literate workers to gain skills that lead to more productive lives.

Each adult student receives individualized, one-to-one tutoring, based on his or her assessed needs, in a confidential setting that promotes learner success. Each volunteer tutor meets with a student for 1 1Ž2 or 2 hours a week. Most tutoring occurs in a limited space at the Drake University School of Education. When more convenient, some tutor-student pairs to meet at area libraries or community centers. Tutoring services are free. Students pay only an annual \$50 enrollment fee, which can be waived based on financial need.
