1. On the first day that a class meets, it should be validated online by the instructor via BlueView or MYDUSIS. 1. On Friday, August 8 the Board of Educational Examiners approved changing the special education licensure structure to ONE sped endorsement (K-12; all areas; all severities). If this goes into effect, all other special education endorsements will sunset July 1, 2019.

The Notice of Intended Action will be published in the September 3rd edition of the Administrative Bulletin. The hearing will be Wednesday, September 24 at 1 PM in 3SW (Grimes Building). The published notice will direct people to send any written comment to Kim Cunningham at the BOEE prior to Friday, September 26.
