By Vanessa Miller, The Gazette Critics, including at least one regent, are calling on the state Board of Regents to reconsider a funding model it approved in June that will change the way state dollars are allocated to Iowa's public universities and could pull \$47.8 million from the University of Iowa over several years.

In emails obtained by The Gazette, university faculty, Iowa residents and Regent Bob Downer question the process and timing involved in developing a new way of funding the UI, Iowa State University and the University of Northern Iowa. A UI representative on the task force that proposed the funding model also expressed concerns to Gov. Terry Branstad, calling the process 'flawed.' Just days before the model was approved, Downer in an email told a constituent that he thought the Board of Regents was moving too quickly and the issue

4. Branstad, Reynolds offer higher education plan Proposal aims to make college more affordable, reduce debt

DES MOINES - Gov. Terry Branstad and his running mate, Lt. Gov. Kim Reynolds, traveled to college campuses Tuesday offering their plan for making higher education affordable and reducing student debt.

During stops at Iowa State University in Ames and Drake University in Des Moines, the GOP team proposed offering fixed-price degrees or \$10,000 bachelor's degrees at public universities, as well as tax credits for students who volunteer in qualifying community activities.

Fueled by federal grant money and state policy, education systems across the United States (including Colorado) are engaged in a large-scale effort to dramatically improve the quality of teachers and principals through evaluations.

These evaluations go where no school system has gone before in that they require the use of student outcomes (in many cases, standardized test scores) to be heavily weighted in the overall merit rating. For a policy that practically every public school system in the nation is pursuing, the lack of evidence to support its effectiveness is staggering. Presidential Search Committee status report: There are currenlty approximately 75 applicants. There is rich diversity across the pool and there are plenty of well qualified applicants. The timeline is that the board will get the list of of the best candidates soon, with interviews expected in October or November and a decision in December or January.

The campus committee will have some input but there will not a vote on the final decision. No open forums will be available, as some of the top candidates are currently employed elsewhere and need to keep their applications confidential.
