The authors also created the Academic and Career Excellence System (ACES) a norm-referenced, self-assessment of non-cognitive and college skills. Students utilize ACES and the text to determine strengths and build personal success plans to bolster skills critical for strong performance in college and beyond. Sample decentralized accountability quote from this month's BOEE newsletter:
"Educators are sometimes surprised to find out that they are working outside of their endorsement areas. This may result in significant fines and/or an ethics violation. It is your responsibility to teach exactly within your endorsement areas listed on your license. School districts should also report assignments to us accurately in the fall. Our office will then assist staff to obtain conditional licensure if necessary."
