Gov. Terry Branstad expects Iowa will avoid a state government shutdown on July 1, but he isn't anticipating a quick resolution of a stalemate over education spending that could delay adjournment of the 2015 legislative session.

Iowa House and Senate leaders still hope to adjourn on May 1, which is the 110th calendar day of the session and the date that lawmakers' daily expense payments are cut off. But Branstad said Monday he recognizes it will take time to work out a budget deal.

"Being realistic, I don't think it will be resolved this week. I would hope it would be completed by the end of May," Branstad told reporters at his weekly news briefing.

Education is expected to be the biggest line item in the state budget for the state fiscal year that starts July 1. While some other states have had state government shutdowns because of budget battles, Branstad said lowa lawmakers have been able to eventually resolve their differences in the past and he expects the same will happen this year without affecting state government operations.

"No, I don't see a government shutdown. I see that we have every reason to believe that this will be resolved. We just need to get the job done," Branstad said.

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
