Beisser Interview: South Korea Service-Learning and Character Education

Education Professor Sally Beisser was interviewed Thursday, July 16 during a popular morning radio broadcast, This Morning with Alex Jensen in Seoul, South Korea.

Producers asked Dr. Beisser to provide commentary on the Korean Character Education Promotion Act that was approved by the Korean National Assembly in January 2015 going into effect this week in July. "Teachers will be required to pass a training program for character education and teacher-training institutes must offer coursework. Schools will be evaluated on program effectiveness at the end of each year and the government has the option of outsourcing programs."

Beisser has extensive experience in character education program development through service-learning publications, including national and state leadership. She integrates Service-Learning pedagogy and Character Counts in her pre-service methods courses, workshops for practicing teachers, and will spend two weeks this fall in University of KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa presenting on service-learning and conducting collaborative research with UKZN Professor Angela James.

Beisser is pursued for follow up training in Service-Learning and Character Education programs for South Korean educators who teach kindergarten, elementary, middle and high school students. They need to teach students how to develop "humane character and capabilities" in class next year, according to the new law.

Revising the No Child Left Behind Act: Issue by Issue. By Alyson Klein.

The U.S. Senate has voted to pass a bipartisan bill to rewrite the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which hasn't gotten a facelift since 2002, when then-President George W. Bush signed the law's current version, the No Child Left Behind Act. Now the legislation will have to go to conference with a bill passed by the U.S. House of Representatives earlier this month. Issues highlighted in this "cheat sheet to chanages" are: Testing, Accountability, Standards, Teacher Quality, Low-Performing Schools, School Choice, Funding Provisions, Federal Programs and Preschool
