# Spotlight - Counseling student receives Lifesaving Award

On July 10, 2016, Johnston Police received a call of a CPR in progress at a residence in Johnson. Drake University Clinical Mental Health Counseling student Jessica Jensen was the first responding officer on the scene and observed a man suspected to be in cardiac arrest in the backyard of the home. Sgt. Jensen continued with CPR. Johnston Fire Department personnel arrived on scene and conducted an initial assessment as Sgt. Jensen continued chest compressions. After the initial rounds of CPR complete Sgt. Jensen stopped to check for a pulse and located it. At that point, the Johnston Fire Department took over treatment of the patient and continued to provide advanced life support during transport to a nearby medical facility. Sgt. Jessica Jensen was given a very well deserved Lifesaving Award by the Johnston Police Department to recognize her compassion and commitment to the citizens she serves.

We also don't have much personal space in Turkey. I remember as a student in Alabama I couldn't understand why people moved away or why people were in different corners of the elevator. Those type of hidden rules of a culture—it's about understanding the differences and adjusting accordingly. The adjustment was exciting first, then scary, then confusing, then exciting again. After all these years this country became a new home, a second home for us.

#### What are your areas of expertise or interest?

One of my areas is studying and teaching about crosscultural differences and diversity. I operate based on stories. If we see people as categories, we're not going to see them as human beings; it's easy to detach ourselves. But stories can bridge that gap and eliminate the barriers those categories create. Let's listen to each other, hear our stories, and let's grow together.
