## **Eleven Leadership Lessons from Abraham Lincoln**

In this Harvard Business Review article (excerpted from a new book, Leadership in Turbulent Times, Simon and Schuster), historian Doris Kearns Goodwin analyzes Abraham Lincoln's decision to issue the Emancipation Proclamation. Here are the precepts she draws from Lincoln's fateful decision – broadly applicable to leaders in other venues:

- Acknowledge when failed policies demand a change in direction.
- Anticipate contending viewpoints.
- Know when to hold back and when to move forward.
- · Set an example.
- Understand the emotional needs of the team.

- Refuse to let past resentments fester.
- Control angry impulses.
- Protect colleagues from blame.
- · Keep promises.
- · Gauge sentiment.
- · Establish trust.
